1 Introduction

MB6800 is the industrial first and the most integrated WLAN and 3rd generation cellular (3G) solution for Enterprise, Home, Small Office and Home Office (SOHO). The products are simple to use and easily scalable. MB6800 is a 3G router for SMB market based on our MobileBridge™ platform technology.

MB6800 combines the best of Wi-Fi and 3G mobile communications technologies including CDMA 1x, EV-DO, EDGE, UMTS and supports EV-DO Release A and HSDPA.

MB6800 bridges wireless networks of 802.11b/g standards and wired networks, allowing them to communicate with each other. MB6800 allows authorized users to share the Internet access.

Use the instructions in this guide to help you connect MB6800, set it up, and configure it to work.

2 Installing the MB6800

Installing the MB6800 is easy. Follow the quick steps below to power up your wireless network:

- Verify kit content;
- Write down product ID;
- Power up the MB6800;
- LED Indicators;
- Initialize the MB6800 unit



2.3 Power up the MB6800

Connect the MB6800 power supply (refer to Figure 2-2) and press the power switch down.

2.5 Initialize the MB6800 Unit

1. Connect MB6800 with your computer, there are two ways to connect MB6800 with your computer:

- I. Connect your computer to MB6800 using the attached Ethernet cable and your computer is set to be “Obtain an IP address automatically”.

- II. Alternatively, you can connect your computer to MB6800 with wireless LAN.
 - a) Enable the WiFi interface in your laptop or PC. Make sure it works.
 - b) Configure the Wireless LAN card to match the network name and encryption key of Wireless LAN card installed in the MB6800. The default network name is the SN of this device, and “Automatic IP” configuration is also needed.




Figure 2-4 Home page

2. Validate that your computer has got IP address from the MB6800, then open the web browser and enter <http://172.16.0.1>. Press Enter then the MB6800 login screen appears (Figure 2-3 login window). Enter the username/password (default is public/public), and click OK, the home web page appears (Figure 2-4 home page).

- **Host Name:** Up to 64 characters name to represent MB6800. The device default name is topglobalXXXXXX(“XXXXXX” means the last 6 digits of SN)
- **Serial Speed:** When you need a backup link (for example, the v.90 modem) for MB6800, you might need to configure the serial speed for the modem. There are totally 6 options for the serial speed (bps): 115200, 57600, 38400, 19200, 9600, and

4800. You may need to reference to the user guide of the modem to configure the right speed.

- **ALG plugin:** This technique relies on the installation of a new, enhanced Firewall/NAT - called an Application Layer Gateway. MB6800 provides two kinds of ALG plugin names SIP and H.323. When you choose either, you can plug the protocol.
- **Username:** Username for MB6800's web administration. The default username is public.
- **Password:** Password for MB6800's web administration. The default password is public.
- **WebGUI Protocol:** The protocol web configuration used. HTTP is the only Current choice.
- **WebGUI port:** The service port for HTTP. User normally need not modify this value. If you want to allow someone else to manage the MB6800 from WAN, you can check **Enable management from WAN**, and modify the port value according to your needs.



Note:

Submit doesn't mean saving the configuration information. User must reboot the system, and then the configuration will be saved. So if user saves the configuration, and doesn't reboot the device through web page, the configuration information will be lost.

Normally, MB6800 can't be configured through WAN interface because of security and other concerns. If user wishes to remotely configure the MB6800 through WAN interface, there is one box to select to enable this feature.



Note:

Each time when the user modifies the username and password, the system will request the user to re-authenticate the new user name and password.

- **Enable SNMP:** It let the administrator can manage the MB6800 through the SNMP protocol. At the same time, you must specify the **Read-Only communicate Name** and **Read-Write communicate Name**, which enable the SNMP Manager to access MB6800 safely. Also, MB6800 supports to send trap information to a remote trap server to report the status of devices. Enable this function, you must specify the IP address of **Trap server** and **Trap interval**, which indicates the frequency of the device for sending trap information to the server.



MB6800 can be configured to disconnect from Internet connection after a specified period of inactivity (Max Idle Time). If the Internet connection has been

terminated due to inactivity, Dial on Demand enables MB6800 to automatically re-establish the Internet connection as soon as you attempt to access the Internet again. Enter a number in seconds you want your internet connection to last when there is no data transmission.







4.2 Introduction

This section helps you to locate problems related to MB6800 setup. The most common installation problems are related to the IP address. For example, without the TFTP server IP address, you will not be able to download firmware to MB6800.

IP address management is critical and we suggest you to create a chart to document and validate the IP addresses of your system.

If the password is lost or forgotten, you will need to reset the MB6800 to default values. The **Reset to Factory Default** procedure resets the MB6800 configuration settings, but does not change the current firmware. The **Forced Reload** procedure will erase the current firmware and configurations, please use it with caution when you need to download new software.

Reset to Factory Default Procedure

Use this procedure to reset the network configuration values, including the MB6800 IP Address, Subnet Mask, and so on. The current MB6800 Software will not be erased. This

procedure may be required if the password is forgotten or the configurations are forgotten.

When MB6800 is working in normal status, **press and holds the RELOAD button for about 20 seconds, until all the indicator lights change to amber.** Then release **RELOAD** button, and press reset button to reboot MB6800, the factory default network values are restored. Please refer Table 6-1 for the factory default value.



Warning:

If you press and hold the **RELOAD** button for more than 10 seconds immediately after the MB6800 is power on or reset, the MB6800 will enter Force Reload Procedure. The software in the MB6800 will be erased. You will have to download software into MB6800 to make it work again.

Forced Reload Procedure

Use this procedure to force the MB6800 back to default network configuration values and download new MB6800 software. This procedure may be required when the current MB6800 software is missing, corrupted or needs to be upgraded.

Download procedure

1. Prepare you TFTP server. TFTP server is a computer with TFTP server software running. TFTP server can be freely downloaded from www.solarwinds.net. You can also search other TFTP servers from Internet if you like.
2. To download the MB6800 Software, you will need an Ethernet connected to the computer on which the TFTP server resides. This can be any computer on the LAN, or connected to the MB6800's "LAN" port with a "crossover" Ethernet cable.
3. After force reload, MB6800's IP will be set to 172.16.0.1 by default, and MB6800 will login the TFTP server with IP address "172.16.0.2" to download software named "firmware.bin" by default. So please change the IP address of TFTP server to 172.16.0.2, and change the MB6800 software name to **firmware.bin**, put it in the directory of TFTP server root.
4. After finishing this preparation, power on the MB6800.

5. Press the **RESET** button.
6. Press and hold the **RELOAD** button for about 10 seconds immediately after you press and release the **RESET** button until the POWER LED turns amber and the WWAN LED turns off. Result: The MB6800 deletes the current MB6800 software and Configuration files. Then MB6800 will download the software you have prepared in step 3. Observe what the TFTP displays and you should see downloading activity begins after a few seconds.
7. After finish this procedure, MB6800 will reboot automatically and you can see the POWER LED turns amber and blinks.
8. MB6800 will be configured to the factory default value. Please refer Table 6-1 for the factory default value.

Firmware Upgrade Procedure through Web

Use this procedure to upgrade the newest version firmware for MB6800 through Web interface on user client. This procedure may be necessary when a new version of firmware is released(Figure 4-1).

- If the PCs are configured correctly, but still not working, check MB6800. Ensure that it is connected and powered on. Connect to it and check its settings. (If you cannot connect to it, check the LAN and power connections.)
- If MB6800 is configured correctly, check your Internet connection (WWAN card) to see if it is working correctly.
- Manually configure the TCP/IP settings with a DNS address provided by your ISP.
- Make sure that your browser is set to connect directly and that any dial-up is disabled. For Internet Explorer, click Tools, Internet Options, and then the Connection tab. Make sure that Internet Explorer is set to Never dial a connection. For Netscape Navigator, click Edit, Preferences, Advanced, and Proxy. Make sure that Netscape Navigator is set to Direct connection to the Internet.

Frequently Asked Questions

What is the maximum number of IP addresses that MB6800 will support?

MB6800 will support up to 253 IP addresses.

Is IPSec Pass-Through supported by MB6800?

Yes, it is a built-in feature that MB6800 automatically enables.

Does MB6800 support IPX or AppleTalk?

No. TCP/IP is the only protocol supported.

What is Network Address Translation and what is it used for?

Network Address Translation (NAT) translates multiple IP addresses on the private LAN to one public address that is sent out to the Internet. This adds a level of security since the address of a PC connected to the private LAN is never transmitted on the Internet.

Furthermore, NAT allows MB6800 to be used with low cost Internet accounts. The user may have many private addresses behind this single address provided by the ISP.

Does MB6800 support any operating system other than Windows 98, Windows Millennium, Windows 2000, or Windows XP?

Yes.

Does MB6800 support ICQ send file?

Yes, with the following fix: click ICQ menu -> preference -> connections tab->, and check I am behind a firewall or proxy. Then set the firewall time-out to 80 seconds in the firewall setting. The Internet user can then send a file to a user behind MB6800.

Can multiple gamers on the LAN get on one game server and play simultaneously with just one public IP address?

It depends on which network game or what kind of game server you are using. It will work if the game server supports multi-user with one public IP address.

Which browsers does MB6800 support?

MB6800 supports Internet Explorer 4.0, Netscape 4.0, Mozilla and Safari which mainly used in Macintosh.

I am not able to get the web configuration screen for MB6800. What can I do?

You may have to remove the proxy settings on your Internet browser, e.g., Netscape Navigator or Internet Explorer. Or remove the dial-up settings on your browser. Check with your browser documentation, and make sure that your browser is set to connect directly and that any dial-up is disabled. For Internet Explorer, click Tools, Internet Options, then the Connection tab. Make sure that Internet Explorer is set to Never dial a connection. For Netscape Navigator, click Edit, Preferences, Advanced, and Proxy. Make sure that Netscape Navigator is set to Direct connection to the Internet.

Does MB6800 pass PPTP packets or actively route PPTP sessions?

MB6800 allows PPTP packets to pass through.

Is MB6800 cross-platform compatible?

Any platform that supports Ethernet and TCP/IP is compatible with MB6800.

Can MB6800 act as my DHCP server?

Yes. MB6800 has DHCP server software built-in.

What is the IEEE 802.11g standard?

It is one of the IEEE standards for wireless networks. The 802.11g standards allow wireless networking hardware from different manufacturers to communicate, provided that the hardware complies with the 802.11g standards. The 802.11g standards state a maximum data transfer rate of 54Mbps and an operating frequency of 2.4GHz. The 802.11g is downward compatible with 802.11b.

What IEEE 802.11b features are supported?

The product supports the following IEEE 802.11b functions:

- CSMA/CA plus Acknowledge protocol
- Multi-Channel Roaming
- Automatic Rate Selection
- RTS/CTS feature
- Fragmentation
- Power Management

Will the information be intercepted while it is being transmitted through the air?

WLAN features two-fold protection in security. On the hardware side, as with Direct Sequence Spread Spectrum technology, it has the inherent security feature of scrambling. On the software side, WLAN offers the encryption function (WEP or WPA) to enhance security and access control.

What is WEP?

WEP is Wired Equivalent Privacy, a data privacy mechanism based on a 64-bit or 128-bit shared key algorithm, as described in the IEEE 802.11 standard.

What is WPA-PSK?

WPA-PSK means Wi-Fi Protected Access - Pre-Shared Key. It is an enhanced wireless encryption standards defined by the WiFi Alliances.

What is a MAC Address?

The Media Access Control (MAC) address is a unique number assigned by the manufacturer to any Ethernet networking device, such as a network adapter, that allows the network to identify it at the hardware level. For all practical purposes, this number is usually permanent. Unlike IP addresses, which can change every time a computer logs onto the network, the MAC address of a device stays the same making it a valuable identifier for the network.

How do I reset MB6800 to factory default?

When MB6800 is working in normal status, press and hold the **RELOAD** button for about 20 seconds, until all the indicator lights turn off. Then release **RELOAD** button, press the **RESET** button to set up the device again. This will reset MB6800 to its default settings.

How do I resolve issues with signal loss?

There is no way to know the exact range of your wireless network without testing. Every obstacle placed between MB6800 and a wireless PC will create signal loss. Lead glass, metal, concrete floors, water and walls will inhibit the signal and reduce range. Start with MB6800 and your wireless PC in the same room and move it away in small increments to determine the maximum range in your environment. You may also try using different channels, as this may eliminate interference affecting only one channel.

I have excellent signal strength, but I cannot see my network.

WEP or WPA-PSK is probably enabled on MB6800, but not on your wireless client. Verify that the same keys are being used on all nodes of your wireless network.

How many channels/frequencies are available with MB6800?

There are eleven available channels, ranging from 1 to 11 (in North America).
